

On December 8, 2004, Dr. Peter Sharpe gave a lecture at the Santa Barbara Museum of Natural History. Peter <sup>1</sup>irects Bald Eagle restoration and monitoring projects or the Institute for Wild Life Studies (IWS) on Catalina and Santa Cruz Islands. During his lecture, Peter gave an overview of the history of Bald Eagles on the Channel Islands, reasons for their decline, and explained IWS efforts to increase the population in Southern California. The following day, Peter joined the Cachuma Lake Park Naturalists for an Eagle Cruise.

Historically, Bald Eagles inhabited all Channel Islands and the Santa Barbara mainland, but completely disappeared from these areas by the early 1960s. Although many human activities may have contributed to the decimation of the Bald Eagle population, the most probable culprit is the use and disposal of the pesticide DDT. From 1947 through 1961, more than 2000 metric tons of DDT are estimated to have been dumped offshore of Palos Verdes and Catalina Island. Although the manufacture and use of DDT has since been banned in the U.S., it continues to persist on the ocean floor. Consumption of DDT-contaminated prey causes the thinning of eggshells. The eggs easily dehydrate and crack under the weight of adult eagles.

The IWS started the restoration project on Catalina in 1980 and under Peter's direction, extended it to Santa Cruz Island in 2002. They began by releasing young



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Bald Eagles from Alaska on Catalina Island. Thirty-three Bald Eagles were released between 1980 and 1986. As the eagles matured, some left the island and others paired up and began nesting. Once again, thin eggshells posed a problem. The solution was Peter's consent to be the "dope on a rope." He is lifted by helicopter up to remote nest sites where he removes the eggs and replaces them with artificial eggs. The eggs are then sent to the San Francisco Zoo where they are safely incubated and hatched. Peter then returns the young to the nest at 1 to 2 weeks old with a healthy start at life in the wild.

Thanks to the IWS there are currently 5 active nesting sites on Catalina and 24 immature Bald Eagles inhabiting Santa Cruz and the neighboring Channel Islands. Because all the eagles are not expected to stay at their release sites, they are fitted with shoulder tags and telemetry equipment to aid in tracking their movements. The tags are numbered and coded orange for Catalina and blue for Santa Cruz release sites. Cachuma Lake naturalists have been in contact with the IWS since February 2002 when #20, a tagged immature Bald Eagle from Catalina, was spotted soaring over the lake. Since then, two other eagles from Catalina have been seen at Cachuma Lake. Peter is contacted each time and records the Cachuma Lake sightings in his tracking data. The Cachuma Lake naturalists continue to keep an eye out for tagged eagles and look forward to working with Peter and the IWS in the future.

# Campground Host for the Nature Center

In early September, Alison Hubbard became the hostess and will continue until March 1. Alison actually became a Nature Center Docent in the fall of 2002, and was the chairperson for the first yard sale. At that time she also worked as a host in the Park office. She came to Santa Barbara in 1978 with her son, Anson, and worked at ABC-Clio and at Santa Barbara Research Center as a computer programmer. 
