A GOOD TIME NOT CATCHING FISH! • LINDA TAYLOR

Thirty-six kids and many of their parents participated in the first Kids' Fishing Workshop of the summer on Saturday morning July 22. Beginning with a wonderful computer presentation by Santa Barbara City College biology prof Larry Friesen on life in the Lake—from microorganisms to the angler, kids were given instruction on many aspects of fishing. Special Guest for the day was Greg Compton, author of the book, "Let's Go Fishing," a copy of which was given to each participant. Mike Moropoulos shared his knowledge and experience catching trout. Bruce Vanderhoef demonstrated and gave hands-on practice tying knots. Rigging and fishing for crappie, bluegill and bass was ably taught by Harry DeWitt. Demonstrating and assisting youngsters in casting were Art Olivera, Dick Cofiell, Paul Taylor, Tommie Miller, Neal Taylor, Judy Duncan and Kirby Duncan, using rods and reels donated by the Fred Hall Fishing Tackle Show. Santa Barbara County Fish and Game Commission underwrites these events; each child goes home with a bag of fishing gear, including a cap and small camera donated by the Fred Hall Show. A second workshop is scheduled for August 19, for children from 7 to 15 years. No pre-registration is required, but enrollment is limited to the first 50 children to arrive. Activities begin at 9:00 a.m. and end between 12:00 and 12:30. Parents are encouraged to accompany their children.

Focus On Volunteers: Dick And Lois Cofiell

Dick Cofiell came to Cachuma Lake Nature Center with Daryl Rutherford (recently deceased Docent) after taking the Lake Cruise in 2001. Both men's interest was piqued by the exhibits and they agreed they would like to spend time here.

Dick is a critical member of the organization at this point. With a long history of being the "Fix-it-Guy"----Dick brings many skills to his tasks. On any given Wednesday, he can be found fixing failed lighting fixtures, installing locks, building exhibit cases, stands, or accessories for exhibits or special events, assisting with computer tasks, mowing the lawn, and most importantly, helping in any way he can with nearly every special event.

Dick was raised in Whitehall Maryland on a 360 acre family farm where there were cows, pigs, turkeys, chickens, mules, horses, and where corn, wheat, barley, oats were raised. He learned about all things mechanical helping his Grandfather keep farm machinery in running order.

Current Summer Evening Sky

August is the time of the annual Persied meteor showr. The shower should peak the early morning hours—of August 12th and 13th. One problem this year, other than possible clouds or fog, will be the bright waning gibbous moon which will wash out some of the shower.

The planet, Jupiter, is still the brightest object (other than the moon) in the current evening sky. It is found in the southwest sky, slowly moving toward the western horizon as the weeks go by. Vega, the brightest star of the Summer Triangle, is almost directly overhead in the early evening. Vega is part of the constellation Lyra, the harp, which is made up of a small parallelogram shape of stars coming off to the southeast of Vega. Below Vega in the northeastern sky is Deneb, another point of our Summer Triangle.

Deneb is part of the constellation known as the Northern Cross or Cygnus, the swan. In the current evening sky the Cross is lying on its side with Deneb being the top of the top of the Cross. Three more stars, trailing off to the southwest make up the rest of the upright part of the Cross. The cross piece of the Cross comes off the second tar from Deneb, one star out to the east and one to the west. To find Cygnus, the swan; start at Deneb which is the tail of the swan (the word deneb actually means tail) and move toward the southwest along the the upright part of the "Cross" through the body, long neck and head of the swan. Go back to the second star from Deneb and find the cross piece of the "Cross". Go out two stars on each side and you have the wings of the swan. If you are lucky to be viewing from a dark place, you should be able to see that the "Swan" is flying in the middle of the Milky Way.

Altair is the third point of the Summer Triangle. You will find it toward the southeast from Vega and Deneb. Altair is part of the constellation Aquila, the eagle. The eagle is not an easy constellation to explain or find, at least for me. Just know that it is there around Altair.

To get a Guided Tour of the current evening sky, show up for an Astronomy Night at Cachuma Lake. Astronomy Nights are scheduled for Saturday August 5 & 26, September 2 and possibly October 7. The night starts with a slide presentation by Chuck McPartlin at 8:00 PM in the jireside Theater followed at 9:00 PM by telescope viewing and Guided Sky Tour at Dakota Plains. Plan to join us on one of these nights for an astronomically good time.

SUNday at the Lake

Table decorations included members of the sunflower family and the attendees were asked to help identify the specimens before supper was served. The meal, masterfully prepared by Chef Helen, began with Sun Chips and sunflower seeds and ended with strawberry shortcake. And a good time was had by all!

Abundance Of Birds

For the past several years and this year the Cachuma Lake Nature Center has been participating in the annual FeederWatch Project sponsored by Cornell lab of Ornithology from November through April. End of the Season News Notes from Cornell Lab states that "more than 59, 000 checklists have been submitted...from across the US and Canada. The total number of birds counted stands at more than 3.5 million...." for the 2005-2006 season. The feeders and immediate area outside the mirrored window in the bird room of the Nature Center were watched on two consecutive days during each predetermined count period. We counted every other week from November 16 to April 5. Thanks to the diligence of naturalists Liz Mason and Halli Pedersen, and volunteers Linda Taylor and Helen Osenga the Nature Center was able to report its sightings to the project.

Of the birds commonly seen regularly were Brown-headed Cowbirds, Red-winged Blackbirds, Great-tailed Grackles, Band-tailed Pigeons, White-crowned Sparrows, House Sparrows, House Finches, Mourning Doves, Anna's Hummingbirds, Western Scrub-Jays, Oak Titmouses (or is it Titmice?). Occasionally sighted were Brewer's Blackbirds, Dark-eyed Junco, European Starlings, Lesser Goldfinches, Acorn Woodpeckers, There were fewer sightings of Golden-crowned Sparrows, American Crows, White-breasted Nuthatches, and Spotted Towhees. During the entire count period only one Cooper's Hawk and one Ruby-crowned Kinglet were sighted. Although there are many more species of birds in the Park and immediate area the above birds represent those who come to the feeders provided by the Nature Center. If you are personally interested in being a FeederWatcher next season check out the website at http://birds.cornell.edu/pfw . Individuals as well as groups are welcome to join in the count.
