Nature Center Docents and others were honored by the Board of Directors on October 5, 2003, with a barbecue prepared by Director Dennis Daniel in the private picnic area belonging to the marina concession.

Barbara Gutmann and Dick Cofiell were singled out for outstanding service as Docents of the Year at this annual event.

This year Barbara has worked on a committee in a year-long project of revising Docent Policies. Repeatedly she has acquired numerous donations of merchandise, cash, and gift certificates from local merchants and businesses for Trout Derby prizes. Her organizational ability helped to ensure presentation of Zoo-to-You again this past spring. She has planned or helped to plan various social events: the Christmas Party, the Docent Recognition event, the Trout Derby pot luck, and volunteer recruitment coffee hours, as well as a fund-raiser fashion party in her own home. In years past she has also been President and secretary of the Docent Organization. She also takes her turn regularly in hosting the Nature Center on weekends.

Dick Cofiell began his work at the Center helping to build exhibits and doing maintenance tasks on the building; however, he has more recently fallen into leadership roles as vice-president of the Docent Organization, frequently filling in to chair meetings in the absence of the president. Beginning early this summer Dick has worked very hard as chairperson of the first Barn Dance/Barbecue. Dick has kept projects going in the Center and workshop including computer tasks and hands-on wood working. He also takes his turn at hosting the Center and on perfoming Trout Derby assignments.

Two special awards were presented. The Santa Ynez Valley News was spotlighted for its consistent coverage of Nature Center Events. The gratitude of the Nature Center Organization was expressed to Susan Hamm for her on-going organization and leadership with special children's activities during Trout Derby and the Nature Center's Fifteenth Birthday Party this summer.

A unique award was presented to Docent Fred Blaser for the many years he has served as the time keeper of volunteer hours. The award was an old-fashioned dinner bell, which he is expected to ring at noon sharp on work days at the Center, calling volunteers to lunch from wherever they may be on the grounds of the Nature Center. President of the Board, Marion Schlinger, was honored by the Docent Organization for her five years of service to the Nature Center. Long the last half of November, Mars shines brightly high in the southern sky. It sets around 1:30 AM as it loses another third of its brightness. We have several other planets that we can look for as Mars is beginning to dim from its early summer brightness.

Saturn will be rising in the east around 8:00 PM with Orion to its right in the sky. Jupiter rises much later about 1:00 AM, and at dawn it shines as the brightest object in the southwest sky.

Venus is just beginning to make its appearance in the early evening sky. It will be low in the southwest at twilight and sets before dark. In December Venus will be visible higher in the sky each night. Venus was once thought to be two separate bodies which we still commonly refer to as the morning star and evening star. Venus is sometimes called Earth's sister planet as it is similar in size, mass, density and volume; however it turns out that Venus is nothing like Earth. It has no oceans, has an atmosphere composed of carbon dioxide with clouds of sulfuric acid and a surface pressure 92 times that of earth's. If that is not enough to make you think twice about making a visit, Venus has a surface temperature of 900 degrees F, hot enough to melt lead. This is due to a greenhouse effect. As seging the surface of the planet, heat is trapped by the dense atmosphere making Venus hotter than Mercury which is closer to the sun.

One of the oldest and most popular of the Center's exhibits is known as the Mammal Board; wildlife photos are accompanied by a choice of three numbered pushbuttons that are keyed to statements about the pictured subject. Don Wimpress is remembered as developing and building the display many years ago. Time takes a toll on any exhibit that is frequented by eager children: there was a major redo done some time past, but that too has faded. There are many repeat visitors who remember the answers; there was a need for another upgrade. Jacque Fondren took on the job of choosing new wildlife photos and organizing their placement; Alan Schwartz scanned, optimized and printed the photos, and the docent workforce will open the case and replace the images. 
