What the Historic Record Tells Us

The August 26th *Food for Thought* presentation was attended by 48 visitors who crowded into the Nature Center to hear Dr. John Johnson's informative, enlightening, and enjoyable lecture *What the Historic Record Tells Us*.

Dr. Johnson has been Curator of Anthropology at the Santa Barbara Museum of Natural History for over 26 years. He has researched the tribal customs and DNA of the Chumash of the Santa Ynez Valley. This group of Chumash have a distinctive gene not found in other tribes. Pictures of the valley, now covered by waters of the lake, showed the three rivers that converged here. Rising ocean levels, land slides, and erosion have hidden much of the record. However, tests show that the Chumash have inhabited this area for about 5,000 to 3,000 years ago.



In addition, we had two more sales than usually held.

The start of the new fiscal year (August 1-September 1 so far) has been slow as there have been fewer campers during this period than in the past. #9 is one scary cat.


#10 hops about.


#11 plays dead sometimes.


#12 is like someone who won't leave you alone.

NTNC "Stars" Honored

Chuck McPartlin, Santa Barbara Astronomical Unit (SBAU) Outreach Coordinator, has been honored with the Las Cumbres Amateur Outreach Award for 2012. This is an international award that honors one astronomer each year for outstanding education to children and the public.

Chuck and his wife Pat have been mainstays at the Neal Taylor Nature Center for many years. Along with a team of other astronomers they present the very popular "star parties" or astronomy night at the Cachuma Lake Fireside Theater where they explain the wonders of the night sky, stars and planets and even have telescopes for the participants to get a close-up look.

The Astronomical Society of the Pacific is the largest general astronomy society in the world. The award was presented at their annual National Convention and Training Symposium on August 7 in Tucson, Arizona. The Santa Barbara chapter (SBAU) has 150 members and was named Astronomy Magazine's number one outreach club in the nation in 2011. Chuck is described as the heart, soul and backbone of the SBAU. He also serves on the NTNC Advisory Board.

Everyone at the Neal Taylor Nature Center and the Santa Barbara County Community Services Department's Cachuma Lake are exceedingly proud of Chuck for this much deserved honor. Congratulations and thank you to Chuck, Pat, and their team for the outstanding programs they continue to bring to the Fireside Theater to thrill and educate park visitors.

Kids Learn Birds

Thirteen kids worked together to identify 40 birds at Cachuma Lake in the June annual workshop, *Kids Learn Birds*. Over two days, we discovered birds on the nature trail and lake. We had stunning views of the secretive Nuttall's Woodpecker and a Hooded Oriole. On the lake, a hoarse-sounding Caspian Tern surprised us as much as the uncommon and graceful-faced Lark Sparrow.

This class animates kids' awareness of the bird life around us. Families contact us from years past and report birds they identified at home feeders. Birding can bring life-long enrichment and lead to citizen science. Join us next June!

Cachuma Lake Report

Lake Level: The elevation of the lake when full is 760 feet above sea level, with a capacity of 217,852 acrefeet. The current elevation, now in early September, is 735.64 feet, or 147,262 acrefeet of water, which is 68% capacity. We don't hear much in the news locally about drought, but we could all do more to become water-wise in our homes and gardens.

Trout Plants: Cachuma Lake Recreation Area is gearing up for fish plants this winter; plants will begin in November and occur monthly through April, when the county will plant 4500 lbs of Nebraska Tailwalkers in early April, and 9,000 lbs for the annual Trout Derby. The great news this year is that our primary supplier, Calaveras Trout out of Merced, has started to raise triploid trout, which can grow to trophy size. Triploid trout are also sterile, so they will not mix with native steelhead in the river and "water down" their gene pool. The whole season trout plant schedule has not been finalized. On the fund raising side of things – Susan Ham and Bruce Vanderhoef along with their book sale team of Diana Hawkins, Shirley McLellan, Pat Donato, Shayna Rockwell, Lois Cofiell and Gil Graves surpassed all of their previous sales records. This year they came close to selling \$7000 worth of books and treasures to help fund the Nature Center. What a team!
